Lethbridge Chapter Activities 2018

January 24 (Luigi's North)

A Miovision Webinar was viewed on the topic of Engineering Applications of Traffic Data Collection. The webinar reviewed Foundations for Successful Engineering Projects, Data for Signal Timing, Corridor Progression, Traffic Impact Studies, and Collection Technology Comparison and how all this can be integrated with Miovision

February 28 (Luigi's Steakhouse South)

Joint luncheon held with the APEGA Lethbridge chapter on a presentation of the City of Lethbridge Transportation Capital Improvement Program (CIP). The 2018-2027 CIP aims to fulfill City Council's commitment to complete projects previously approved, take care of existing asset, and plans for the future. Multiple projects were showcased at the luncheon, such as the Twinning of Whoop Up Dr W, Twinning of University Drive W, Reconstruction of 3 Ave S, and the 7 Ave Bike Boulevard.

March 28 (Luigi's North)

Jinsong Qi from the City of Lethbridge, works as the Traffic Signal Operations Engineer. He gave a presentation based on his experience with the differences and similarities between Traffic Signal Controls in Canada, US, and China. Topics included different types of signals and regulations, and some unique designs in place to deal with challenges

April 25 (Luigi's North)

Ahmed Ali from the City of Lethbridge gave a presentation on The Functional Planning project for the Whoop-Up Drive Interchanges.

Based on the City of Lethbridge Transportation Master Plan indicating that there is adequate capacity along Whoop Up Drive, the interchanges face capacity and congestion issues. Ahmed summarized the project background so far, and public engagement / design process in choosing the best option to increase traffic flow with a reasonable investment in short term while providing recommendations for medium and long-term in case the third bridge is not constructed within that time frame. There were approximately 12 attendees.

May 30 (Luigi's North)

TAC pre-recorded Webinar on TAC Geometric Design Guide for Canadian Roads. This was well attended, as many people wanted to get up to date on the changes in the current edition.

June 27 (Luigi's North)

Jordan Walker from the local office of Ventus Geospatial presented their drone mapping capabilities and how it has been used on a variety of projects in Southern Alberta. The presentation summarized the use of the technologies to produce detailed and accurate mapping and topographic modelling for different design purposes. Approximately 14 attendees showed up for the event

August 29 (River Bottom)

ITE Summer BBQ Social was hosted in the river bottom with 8 attendees. The group gathered to enjoy burgers and nice weather

September 27 (Luigi's North)

They presented on the unique design, construction, and operation challenges experienced on the first facility of it's kind in Alberta. 
October (Luigi's Steakhouse South)

Presenter: Matiur Rahman from Government of Alberta

Topic: City of Calgary Trip Distribution Patterns

Matiur Rahman received his PhD from University of Calgary and started working as a Transportation Planner at Government of Alberta. He has years of experience working with big data. At Government of Alberta, he develops regional trip mode distribution (transit, car, bike and walk) for current (2018) and future horizon (2048) for city of Calgary and the greater area. The presentation covered the vitality of having a Demand Prediction Model, methodology of developing such a model, software used for that, interpretation of some analysis and examples of using the model. The presentation was done remotely and Matiur Joined the session using video call. After presentation, Q&A session was hold and lunch was served. Some photos of the event are as follows.





ITE Event November 16th Friday 2018 – 11 am to 12 noon Presenter: Prof Babak Mehran, University of Manitoba

Topic: Analytical Models for Operating Cost of Bus and Demand Responsive Transit Systems

As cities expand and more residential developments in suburban areas, the authorities have sometimes come across issues with operating a regular bur route is not financially and economically feasible. As a result, studies in search of a solution for this have paid attention on optimizing the operating costs in different ways and looking for low cos operation methods. Accordingly, Demand Responsive Transit Systems have been emerging as a viable option to mitigate the issues with meeting transport demand in suburban areas where transport demand is low. To improve the awareness of this emerging topic among the civil engineering students, the University of Calgary student chapter of ITE organized a research seminar on 16th November Friday at the Civil Engineering Department Premises by Prof. Babak Mehran who is a pioneering researcher in the field of Demand Responsive Transit Systems. Prof. Babak Mehran is an Assistant Professor of Transportation Engineering in the Department of Civil Engineering of the University of Manitoba. He received his PhD in Transportation Engineering from Nagoya University, Japan in 2009.

His presentation was focused on evolution of Demand Responsive Transit Systems and a methodology was proposed to develop analytical models describing operational costs of regular bus and demand responsive transit services as a function of demand or annual ridership. The proposed cost model for regular bus service has three independent parameters i.e. fleet size, vehicle service hours, and vehicle traveled distance, which are all related to demand. Applications of the proposed models and analysis method were demonstrated through a case study in Regina. It was evident that a lot of people were interested to hear about the topic from the significant participation of students. The students gathered a lot of knowledge regarding Demand Responsive Transit Systems and Prof. Babak answered several questions of audience clarifying the issues they had. 
ITE Event Nov 30th-Dec 1st, 2018
