# 1. 2018 ITE TORONTO SECTION EXCLUSIVE SUMMARY

ITE Toronto Section (a.k.a. ITE TO) is the largest Section of Canadian Institute of Transportation Engineers (CITE). This section will provide an overview of what our Section accomplished within 2018, with further details provided later in this report.

# 1.1. Section Executive

ITE Toronto Section kicked of 2018 with three important goals:

- Increase student support
- Become consistent with CITE, publishing Section's information, promoting past and future events and storing newsletters
- Conduct a survey across the membership and program events accordingly

The following amazing executive supported ITE Toronto Section to successfully achieve all three goals:



ITE Toronto has played a key role in promoting the field of transportation in the local universities and colleges. In 2018, the section specifically took on new measures to meet its goal of increasing student support. The section successfully met this goal by prompting and supporting more remote student chapters, supporting establishment of new chapters and more importantly by lowering cost to attend or free in many instances.

Furthermore, ITE Toronto's mandate is to pursue continuous improvement; a successful 2018 would only mean maintaining what has been achieved, building on it and strive for even more successful years in the future - all towards what the membership needs, in particular the student membership.

#### 1.2. Achievements

- ✓ Improved social media presence that is sustainable and practical
- ✓ Boosted awareness and recognition of CITE Lakehead University Student Chapter
- ✓ Support founding of the new CITE York University Student Chapter.






Technical tours and technical trainings amongst the top two events most requested. In 2018 the section successfully executed two technical tours and conducted major planning to hold a technical training in 2019.

# 5.1. Recurring meetings

Toronto Section executive kicked off 2018 with an in-person meeting to brainstorm the overall plan for 2018, including recurring and new events, tentative dates, resource allocation, possible venues and target audience. The section specifically discussed events geared towards student support and engagement, student chapter outreach and recognition. # Breakfast Session Credit River Active Transportation Crossings, City of Mississauga Thursday, March 1st, 2018 @ 8:30AM 300 City Centre Dr, Mississauga, ON L5B 3C1 (Committee Room B)

Dana Glofcheskie and Leslie Green presented the 2018 Toronto Section Project of the Year Award winning project of Credit River Active Transportation Crossings in City of Mississauga. Dana is a Professional Engineer and is a Transportation Project Engineer within the Transportation and Works Department at the City of Mississauga. She has over 10 years of experience in transportation planning industry. Leslie is a Professional Engineer and is the Manager of Technical Services within the Transportation and Works Department at the City of Mississauga. She has over 10 years of experience in transportation planning.



The Credit River Active Transportation Crossings project is an exciting project demonstrates a multi-level government collaboration between the Ontario Ministry of Transportation, Region of Peel and the City to advance key multi-modal initiatives. The recommended plan illustrates an innovative design to building a beautiful, sustainable city with safe neighbourhoods that support strong, connected and vibrant communities, where residents value the beauty of the natural environment, engage in active transportation, and support a rich, healthy and prosperous social and cultural mosaic. The proposed crossings include a north-south AT crossing of the QEW at Stavebank Road and an east-west AT crossing of the Credit River. These crossings will be important to the connectivity of the City's AT network including significantly enhancing connections to the existing and planned trail network. Specifically, these crossings provide critical links along the hydro corridor trail, which is ultimately envisioned to traverse the entire length of the City from Halton Region to the City of Toronto.

Toronto, The Hamilton, Southwest Ontario sections' Presentation Technical Competition for Students is a unique event organized annually by the Canadian Institute of Transportation Engineers (CITE) to help foster interest in the field transportation. of competition offers students an opportunity to present a topic of interest in transportation before their peers and practising transportation professionals.

While technical competence is an important element, the primary focus of the competition is on the ability to present effectively to one's peers and the public.

The winner in the graduate category was Anjie Liu from the University of Waterloo for her presentation on Towards Using Traffic Data to Estimate Vehicle Emissions in Real Time. The winner in the undergraduate category was Samantha Leger from the University of Waterloo for her presentation on Evaluating emerging technologies (through the form of electric-bicycles or "e-bikes") as a tool to address transportation gaps that currently inhibit lifelong mobility and aging in place.

Other participants include Joseph Dominicis from McMaster University, Eric Bentzen-Bilkvist from Mohawk College, and Dhwani Shah from the University of Windsor.

# Technical Tour Mississauga Transitway Tour Thursday, June 28, 2018 | 8am to 12pm



ITE Toronto and the City of Mississauga hosted Mississauga Transitway Tour on Thursday June 28, 2018. The Mississauga Transitway roadway dedicated solely for buses that extends across the City Mississauga from Winston Churchill Boulevard in the west through to Renforth Drive in the east with connections to Hwy 427 in the east and ultimately, once completed, to the Eglinton Crosstown LRT. Riders are spared that ever-present morning and evening

congestion on Hwy 403 and Eglinton Avenue. The 19km facility includes 12 on-line stations and is the first of its kind in the GTHA. The facility opened to the public in stages, the first section being in 2014, and full completion in 2017.

The event included a brief presentation by Scott Anderson, Manager of Transitway Construction, followed by a guided tour of the facility. Scott is a 1984 B.A.Sc. (Civil Engineering) graduate of Queen's University with over 30 years of employment with the City of Mississauga. He is responsible for the coordination of the planning, design, and construction of all phases of the Transitway.

# Multi-Modal Transportation Analysis - Panel Discussion

As the transportation network in the GTA becomes increasingly congested, non-vehicular modes of transportation are becoming increasingly important for reasons of



health, safety, public realm improvement and congestion reduction. As a result, multi-modal transportation analysis for new developments is becoming an increasingly central component transportation impact studies in the urban context. The section reached out to their mailing list with an invitation to an interactive panel

discussion on Multi-Modal Transportation Analysis.

The purpose of this interactive session was to discuss key aspects of multi-modal analysis from a range of perspectives including review agencies, public realm designers, transportation consultants and technical analysis groups.

The panel included professionals from York Region, the City of Toronto, BA Group and IBI Group.

analysis, and showed some successful applications of where it has been used effectively to date.

Immediately after the presentation, the group relocated 200m down the street to Scallywags for an opportunity to network and socialize.

The luncheon featured presentations from the City of Thunder Bay on the City's Designated Truck Route project, the Ministry of Transportation of Ontario Northwestern



Region on the Thunder Bay Expressway project, and ITE Toronto Section on emerging directions in transportation engineering.

Outreaching and promoting more remote student chapters was identified on the section's 2018 survey and the section initiated a focus group to program an event to occur in Thunder Bay focusing on local students from Lakehead University and the local practitioners from the City of Thunder Bay and the Ministry of Transportation Ontario.

The luncheon featured several Northwestern Ontario-based presentations, such as ones from the City of Thunder Bay and the Ministry of



Transportation of Ontario Northwestern Region. The luncheon also included a presentation from Amy Jiang, Vice President of ITE Toronto Section, who spoke about the roles of the Canadian Institute of Transportation Engineers (CITE) within the world of transportation.

  was to assess alternatives to upgrade the expressway to a freeway standard with
  grade separated interchanges and divided median.

transit hub to support airport growth and regional connectivity, while providing significant economic and social benefits to the entire Greater Golden Horseshoe.

# 7.1. Project of the Year Award

8th Annual Project of the Year Award was presented during the section's AGM in Dec 2018. Four nominations were received:

- "King Street Transit Pilot" by City of Toronto
- "Vaughan Metropolitan Centre (VMC) Cycling Network Plan" by City of Vaughan
- "The Dundas Connects Master Plan in City of Mississauga" by AECOM
- "Mississauga Cycling Master Plan Update" by City of Mississauga

"King Street Transit Pilot" by City of Toronto received the 8<sup>th</sup> Annual Project of the Year Award. The project highlighted the following:

- Launched in November 2017, King Street Transit Pilot between Bathurst Street and Jarvis Street, aims to improve transit reliability, speed, and capacity by giving priority to streetcars over private vehicles
- King Street Transit Pilot explored ideas for how to redesign King Street in order to achieve objectives: move people more efficiently, support economic prosperity, improve place-making
- Compared to the November 2017 baseline data, overall weekday ridership of the 504 King streetcar has increased by 17%, with peak period ridership up to 45% higher

As a follow up to winning this award, 'King Street Transit Pilot' was presented in a breakfast session as the section's kickoff event in 2019.
