


Chapter Activities




Transportation Engineering 101



Ask Me Anything (AMA) Session with Transportation Professionals




The chapter hosted a Ask Me Anything session to provide a platform for students to ask questions related to transportation engineering profession. The students asked open-ended questions that were answered by different professionals from the industry. The event was planned as a discussion-based event were speakers spoke about their insights on the topic. Students were able to get their questions and doubts cleared by experts in the field. This event helped in connecting the chapter to various industry leaders and speakers. Students were satisfied and established a stronger connection with the chapter. This also helped them in networking with the present industry professionals. In the end, there was a draw to win an amazon gift card which was won by one of the attendees.





Transportation Industry Night 2021

As the pandemic goes on and our campuses are closed, we tried our best to keep the club engaged. This year, we decided to host our annual industry night virtually on zoom and to our surprise it was a huge success and was our biggest event of the year. We invited professionals from all over the transportation industry. We had about 40 attendees and 8 guest speakers from different companies who attended our event. We had the honour of having Directors from SNC – Lavalin, Project managers from GHD, city of Ottawa contractors for Ottawa's LRT trillium line extension project and other known engineers from the industry. We started off by introducing our Chapter and the executive members to the audience. Then we had a presentation from one of the speakers about the construction of the LRT trillium line. After which, we had questions from the audience for speakers which were answered and then we were divided into breakout rooms. Inside each breakout room were two speakers and a few students. This helped the students communicate and network with the speakers more effectively.



The speakers then shared their experiences and their career stories with aspiring students. Students got to know more about the industry and the work done by engineers in the field. Speakers shared necessary skills and tools required for success in the industry. Students were inspired by the stories of all the speakers and could relate more as most of the speakers were Carleton graduates. After the networking session, we held a draw to give out a \$25 gift card to one of our attendees. The draw was drawn and one of our attendants won the price. This event helped our members list increase, it also increased the popularity of the CITE Carleton chapter among students.

Carleton CITE Mentorship Program

The chapter launched the mentorship program in the fall semester of the school year. The purpose of the mentorship program was to directly connect the students with the professionals and have the students learn from the professionals. We were able to reach out to professionals from the NCS chapter to volunteer as mentors for the program, and we were able to get a good number of students to register for the program. The program was held in the fall and winter semester, and the feedback has been positive.

Design Competition

The Chapter has taken initiative to conduct a design project competition among students. This competition presented a great and exciting opportunity for students interested in transportation engineering and engaged them with the chapter during these difficult times. Through this activity, we led the students to develop interests and skills as well as gain engineering-related experience in transportation engineering that will help them in their career. The project was also designed in such a way that students could complete it from their home, eliminating the need for field observation. The project involved three parts, namely research, design, and documentation. Participants had to research about how streets are classified and had to select and redesign a local street to a complete street to serve multiple users. They were directed to use Streetmix website to develop cross-sections of the street and google street view to gather pictures and data. Then, they were required to document their lessons learned and challenges, also how about they overcame their challenges into a technical report and submit it to be chosen for a price of \$200. We had many students who participated and among them we chose three runners-up:
