As a result of meticulous planning throughout the summer, the student chapter is now recognized as the most active chapter in the entire Faculty of Engineering at McMaster University. Our current position allows us to reach a larger population of the student body and serve as a bridge with industry and academia members.

## Meetings

The student chapter has consistently hosted monthly meetings since the beginning of the academic year in September. These meetings serve as an opportunity to reflect on brief to previous events, collect feedback from our executive team, and brief members on future events, and coordinate their roles. The team had the opportunity to reflect on their break and the events we enjoyed hosting. Moreover, we were able to hear feedback on what they would like us to change. We laid out the necessary steps required to ship our monthly newsletter and begin posting on our multiple social channels. Students and executive members alike enjoyed the "Transportation Research Seminar Series" that was introduced this year. The series showcased the multifaceted nature of transportation engineering by inviting researchers from various fields.

In order to facilitate the process and ease the transition for future members, we've documented all the steps we undertake from brainstorm sessions to poster creation to posting on social media.



## **Student/Younger Member Support (15 points)**

The ITE student chapter has proactively recruited members of the student engineering body, particularly first and second years. Several of these younger student members are now representatives within the chapter.

Further, the student chapter had intended to attend the CITE conference in Vancouver; however, the event has been cancelled due to the ongoing pandemic. We were particularly disappointed when we found out that the CITE 2021 in Hamilton would be cancelled. The conference would have offered the chapter to volunteer as well as host the leadership summit on campus.

In line with our efforts of creating a bridge with industry members, we have reached out to the Hamilton Section with a manifesto of a mentorship program and the associated marketing materials (i.e. posters). Plans are in the works to launch the program next year.

#### **Application of Technical Knowledge (10 points)**

Did your Section/Chapter, for example, address a local transportation issue or collaborate with industry on a project or program.

Our faculty advisor, Dr. Moataz Mohamed, works closely with the transportation body within the City of Hamilton, Hamilton Street Railway (HSR). Hence, we were able to host an event with a Metrolinx project manager to understand their role within the city and what happened to the scrapped LRT project.

In collaboration with Dr. Mohamed, we have been able to offer workshops for students and ITE members to recreate existing intersections in Hamilton on Synchro Traffic Software. We also coordinated with another transportation professor, Dr. Hussein, and invited ITE students to attend VISSIM Software tutorial as part of his undergraduate/graduate level Traffic Analysis course.

#### **Networking Events (10 points)**

Did your Section/Chapter hold any networking events? Describe any events that would have led to a particularly meaningful experience for members.

Networking is embedded in every event we host. From our Transportation Research Seminars to Industry Speaker Sessions, we encourage students to ask questions within the sessions and to reach out after the event is over. In order to facilitate the process of reaching out with speakers, we send an email thanking them for their time, a screenshot of the event, and the email and LinkedIn profile of our speakers.



Prior to the pandemic, these events have enabled members to hold coffee chats to extend the conversation and learn more about the incredible individuals within the transportation field. These coffee chats still do take place (over Zoom).

The student chapter has conducted several recruitment events over the academic year. Initially, we sought to find executive members for roles including Co-President, Vice President of Administration, Vice President of Finance, and Vice President of Communications. The next step consisted of hiring year reps who attended events and advertised events to their peers.

We are planning to participate in a K-12 STEM Outreach event in collaboration with Women in STEM over the next couple of months.
