A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



The 2025 fiscal year marked the first year of our updated three-year strategic plan (2025-2027). I am pleased to share that our organization has made impressive progress across all three priority areas: membership growth and retention, the value of our products and services, and organizational strength.

MEMBERSHIP GROWTH & RETENTION

Our voting membership grew by 1.5% in 2025 compared to 2024, demonstrating continued positive momentum. The number of student members continues to fluctuate, reminding us of the importance of supporting Student Chapters in both recruiting students and encouraging their transition to professional membership as they enter the workforce.

Our Executive Committee, with support from staff, has strengthened communication and coordination with both Student Chapters and Sections. Each fall and spring, we meet with student leaders to review key

milestones and highlight best practices for running a successful chapter. This initiative began a few years ago and has proven highly effective in supporting and engaging our student community. Building on this success, we expanded the approach to our Sections by hosting both virtual and in-person roundtables with Section leadership to share best practices and highlight the support available from ITE Canada. These efforts ensure that our chapters and sections continue to deliver high-quality service to our members across the country. We were honoured to receive the 2025 ITE International District Innovation Award for these initiatives.

Canadian members once again excelled at the ITE International Annual Meeting. In addition to the District honour, highlights from 2025 included Gene Chartier receiving ITE's most prestigious Burton W. Marsh Award for Distinguished Service, ITE Hamilton Section receiving the Section Momentum Award, and Bruce Belmore receiving the Employer Council Nelson J. Shaffer Outstanding Consultant Award. Additionally, three Canadian members—Erik Nevland, Breanna Jackson, and Jacob Lamb—were named ITE Young Leaders to Follow.

VALUE OF PRODUCTS & SERVICES

Our flagship product is our Annual Conference. In 2025, we welcomed over 500 attendees, industry representatives, students, and volunteers from our transportation community to Halifax. We were humbled by the overwhelmingly positive feedback from the post-conference survey, a testament to the dedication of our exceptional volunteers and staff. Thank you to the Local Arrangements Committee (LAC) and additional volunteers from the Atlantic Canada Section as well as the National Technical Program Committee (NTPC) for their diligent work to deliver an outstanding event.

As part of our strategic plan renewal, members expressed a desire for more high-quality technical content. In response, a volunteer team led by our Vice-President Irini Akhnoukh organized the first ever ITE Canada District Virtual Technical Symposium on February 5-6 featuring 15 speakers over two days of sessions on emergency planning, functional planning design, traffic and multimodal analysis, and safety.

This year, our Training Committee successfully launched two impactful programs: Transportation & Affordability: Planning Complete Networks to Reduce Auto-Dependence and Transportation Equity: Developing Solutions for Social Inclusion. Both covered timely topics that are increasingly at the forefront of our industry's practice and were well-received.

Our partnerships with the Transportation Association of Canada (TAC) and the Canadian Association of Road Safety Professionals (CARSP) remain strong. The ITE Canada Technical Liaison Committee (TLC) organized two webinars in 2024-2025, one jointly hosted with CARSP, featuring our Appointee subject matter experts, emerging trends, and projects of interest. The TLC continues to streamline their coordination of ITE Canada's Appointees.

ORGANIZATIONAL STRENGTH

This year, ITE Canada formed a task force comprising volunteers from the Board, Executive Committee, and general membership to review the District's annual budget and provide recommendations on better aligning expenditures with priority areas. This important initiative was led by our Treasurer, Destiny Piper. ITE Canada continues to follow best practices in financial management to ensure the resilience and long-term sustainability of our organization.

We continue a focus our organization and its connections, whether it be strengthening a robust relationship with ITE International through District Director Julia Salvini, a review of policies led by Past President Ryan Vanderputten to ensure they remain current and reflective of our organizational needs, or maintaining ties to our students through Secretary Madhuri Seera.

None of the achievements highlighted would have been possible without the dedication of our remarkable volunteers and staff. I am deeply grateful to the members who contribute their time, passion, and expertise to deliver exceptional programs, products, and services that benefit our profession and future generations.

In closing, I am proud to report that the state of ITE Canada is **strong**, **vibrant**, **and well-positioned to serve our members for many years to come**.

BOARD & EXECUTIVE INITIATIVES



STRATEGIC PLAN

2025 marked the first year of implementation for our **2025-2027 Strategic Plan Update**. Specific strategies were identified by the Board of Directors to be focus areas for the year, highlighted on page 4. We are proud to share that progress has been made on all strategies with actions either completed or initiatied on the identified priorities, highlighted throughout this report.



GOVERNANCE

► Ensure the effectiveness of our systems, policies, and procedures

With the By-Law amendment approved in 2024, the new structure and terms for the ITE Canada Executive Committee began with the 2025 terms. The change to a six member Committee expanded the leadership capacity of our organization by increasing the number and frequency of positions to be filled and reducing the overall time commitment. With a revised Executive Committee composition, the responsibilities allocated to each member were adjusted to find synergies and better accommodate the needs of the various Committees and the products and services we provide.

Additionally, a thorough review and detailed revision process was initiatied to update policies and procedures spanning the organization's operations and governance. The new policies and procedures will reflect our evolving practices and needs as a modern organization.

▶ Review financial commitments and evaluate the benefits to the members

A Budget Review Task Force was struck in 2025 to undertake extensive analysis of ITE Canada District's expenses and revenues and identify risks and opportunities for the organization. This group included current and former members of our Executive Committee and Board of Directors as well as ITE Canada members with previous involvement in conference planning, Section leadership, and other volunteer contributions to the organization. Their varied perspectives resulted in a suite of recommendations presented to the Executive Committee for consideration.



COMMUNICATIONS

In 2025, ITE Canada District updated the visual identity and messaging for our District, Sections, and Student Chapters to align with the newly developed ITE International Brand Guidlines. This included adjustments to our logos and "About Us" messaging. We appreciate the efforts of all Section and Student Chapter volunteers to maintain a consistent ITE brand across the organization.



ITE Canada District continues to support the inaugural years of the Future Transportation Leaders Fund ("Foundation"), an independent charitable foundation established to contribute to the next generation of transportation professionals. The Foundation launched a new scholarship in 2024-2025—the John Morrall Innovation in Transportation Scholarship. The Foundation established a new framework for donor recognition and launched a new website and social media presence.



ITE INTERNATIONAL AWARDS

ITE Canada District was honoured to receive the ITE International 2025 District Innovation Award, recognizing exemplary leadership in strengthening Section and Student Chapter engagement. This award reflects the efforts our District has undertaken through a series of well-coordinated initiatives focused on operational support, knowledge sharing, and strategic resource development for Canadian ITE Sections and Student Chapters. Many additional Canadians were honoured with ITE Awards in 2025, highlighted on page 20.

SUPPORTING LOCAL LEADERS



PROVIDING SERVICES

ITE Canada continues to provide administrative support for Section and Student Chapter operations. These services, such as the provision of corporate information systems, event registration, and communications materials, allow our local leaders to focus their efforts on creating value and experiences for their members and supports a consistent ITE experience across the country.

Our hard working Section leaders serve their members with technical sessions, social events, technical tours, and much more. We saw continued high usage rates by Sections and event attendees of ITE Canada's registration and ticketing system. This is a testatement to the strength of our Sections and desire for transportation professionals to connect with their local ITE communities.



FOSTERING CONNECTIONS

A Section Support Task Force was established in Fall 2024 to consult with Section leaders and identify gaps and opportunities in current practices. One outcome from this work was the establishment of regular Section Roundtables, offering Section leaders a forum to connect and share best practices. Hosted virtually as well as in-person during the Annual Conference, these are providing opportunities for Section Executive members to exchange knowledge on specific areas of operation. An additional area of support offered by ITE Canada is the new assignment of District Executive Liaisons for each Section to have a regular first point of contact who can help mentor and guide Section leaders.

The Student Chapter Info Sessions originally hosted in 2023 have also continued into 2024-2025. There was robust conversation at the in-person session during our Annual Conference about leadership turnover and transition and improvements to ITE Canada's funding and Traffic Bowl registration processes. Efforts are underway by the District to implement the suggestions identified by student leaders and continue to listen and address their needs.

Representatives from our Sections, such as their Student Liaisons and Presidents, have participated in the Student Chapter sessions, helping to foster stronger relationships between Sections and Chapters.

TRAINING

The ITE Canada Training Committee has had a productive year, continuing to provide professional development opportunities to transportation practitioners across Canada. We focused on delivering training sessions that addressed current and emerging issues in transportation. Our efforts were aimed at equipping professionals with the knowledge and skills necessary to promote transportation equity and improve planning of sustainable transportation networks.

This year, we offered *Transportation Equity*: Developing Solutions for Social Inclusion led by 30 Forensic Engineering, which equipped participants with the knowledge to embed equity into everyday transportation practices and decisions by integrating well-established and emerging transportation equity concepts into practical applications. This workshop covered topics such as equity in, public space; emerging mobility modes and technologies, mobility access planning and policy; transportation disadvantage and poverty; and, design parameter and equity connections. Participants gained practical knowledge on strategies for integrating equity considerations into planning and decision-making, with a focus on systematic inclusion and spatial justice.

In addition, our *Transportation & Affordability:* Planning Complete Networks to Reduce Auto-Dependence training led by Mobycon provided practical guidance on the foundation needed to plan for car-lite communities and where practitioners can influence in their work on

planning policies, subdivision plans and transportation impact assessment. This training session included understanding the concept of being a car-dependent, car-free, and car-less and its impacts on access to opportunity and mobility poverty, with case studies of car-lite communities across Canada and developing an understanding of the barriers to implementation. The workshop emphasized the importance of the how a community layout can support multimodal travel through thoughtful street design, land uses, and network structure.

Throughout the year, the Training Committee organized a total of five (5) virtual workshops and two (2) in-person events. One event coincided with the ITE Canada Annual conference in Halifax, and the other was co-hosted by the ITE Toronto Section. These sessions attracted 98 attendees and facilitated knowledge sharing and fostered a sense of community among participants, encouraging collaboration and the exchange of best practices.

The Training Committee worked on and developed a new procurement model in 2025 that would allow the Committee to better serve the interests of membership. Following detailed evaluation and selection, the Training Committee will be pleased to offer two new training courses on the topics of *The Fundamentals of Geometric Design* and *Communications and Engagement* for the 2026 training year.





TECHNICAL EFFORTS & PARTNERSHIPS

The Technical Liaison Committee (TLC) oversees and coordinates ITE Canada District's technical initiatives and partnerships. 2025 has been a big year for TLC, advancing significant changes to deliver its mandate: to ensure ITE Canada members are informed of current technical trends and emerging topics and to support its subject matter Appointees who represent ITE Canada.

Through the TLC, ITE Canada District supported six technical projects in 2024-2025 through both financial contributions (\$25,000 from 2023 to 2025) and expertise from appointed project representatives. By collaborating on these projects, we ensure the perspectives of ITE Canada members are represented in technical products that drive our industry forward.

In addition to a long-standing partnership with the Transportation Association of Canada (TAC), TLC continued supporting connections between ITE Canada District and other professional organizations such as Canadian Association of Road Safety Professionals (CARSP) and Canadian Urban Transit Association (CUTA).

As part of the partnership with CARSP, TLC has coordinated the delivery of two joint webinars offered free to members: Design Guide for Bus Stops Adjacent to Cycling Infrastructure in October 2024 (300 registrants) and Island Platform Bus Stops - Emerging Trends, Technologies & Lessons Learned in October 2025 (230 registrants).

Our Appointees play an important role in connecting ITE Canada to partner organizations and supporting technical projects. Having access to volunteer appointees with expertise and knowledge is only one side of the coin. To fully benefit from these resources, TLC has been working to improve on tools and reporting structure, receiving technical feedback and translating them to meaningful and actionable deliverables with tangible outcomes for the membership. As part of updating its Terms of Reference, TLC has identified procedural solutions to optimize support, engagement, and collaboration with and between Appointees, particularly within their respective subject matters.

The TLC has noticed an increase in response to call for volunteer appointees, in particular from our younger professionals; those who are building their career, ambitious with fresh and innovative ideas, ready to take on roles and give back. In response to this demand and to maximize engagement, TLC has recently started adopting informal opportunities for young professionals to shadow formal appointees within their areas of interest. This is achieved in an organized fashion to ensure continuous interaction and learning, setting them up for success in future appointee roles with ITE Canada.

Together, these efforts aim to improve consistency, elevate the quality of contributions, and ultimately strengthen the value and impact of deliverables for the membership.
